A Note from Jason,

I have been thinking recently about Holy Week and all that goes on in such a short period of time. We begin with the triumphal entry of Palm Sunday then move through the Lord's Supper and the betrayal on Maundy Thursday, journey to Christ's cross on Good Friday and finally we reach the triumph of the resurrection on Easter Sunday.

As I thought about the week I also realized how much you miss if all you do is go to church on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. Don't get me wrong those are both wonderful celebrations. But if

that is all you experience during Holy Week

you simply jump from triumphal entry to triumph over the grave without going through 'the valley of the shadow of death' to use the words of Psalm 23. I think it is important that we walk with Jesus through the fullness of what he went through and remember that he gave "his life as a ransom for many." I don't think we have to be overly morbid about this reflection, but I think we should remember the reason Jesus can identify with us in our pain is because he, God incarnate, also suffered pain and death so that we might have life in him.


One Hymn that I have always found to be powerful in its simplicity is the great Spiritual "Were You There?" The simple yet powerful words: Were you there when they crucified my Lord? Where you there when they nailed Him to the tree? Where you there when they laid Him in the tomb? Such straightforward questions and yet so profound. Because, theologically speaking, we were there, or at least our sin was there being dealt with by Jesus. As Paul writes it in 2 Corinthians 5:21: "For our sake God made the one who knew no sin to be sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

So I hope this upcoming Holy Week you will in some way walk the full journey of Jesus from Triumphal entry, through the valley of the shadow, and then finally to the triumphant resurrection. Whether that is through

attending our Maundy Thursday service or simply taking time to read the Gospel accounts of all Jesus went through that we might have life, I think it is important to remember and reflect on all that God has done in Jesus for us... O --- sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble!

Hebron's Book Club is off to a great beginning



The Stories in Hebron's Stained Glass Windows

Hebron has 11 stained glass windows surrounding our sanctuary that we see each Sunday but may not pay much attention to. In each of these windows is an image formed in stained glass that tells a story. Some images may have more than one story and that story may differ from person to person.

This month's window is INRI John 19:19,21 states: "And Pilate wrote a title, and put it on the cross. And the writing was Jesus Of Nazareth The King Of The Jews... Then said the chief priests of the Jews to Pilate, Write not, The King of the Jews; but that he said, I am King of the Jews."

INRI refers to the Latin translation of Pilates charge: Iesus Nazarenus, Rex Iudaeorum (Jesus the Nazarene, King of the Jews). In Latin the 'I' and 'J' are usually interchangeable and ancient Latin did not use the letter 'J'. That is why it is INRI and not JNRJ.
